

April Program: Painting Reflective Surfaces in Watercolor with Doris Ettlinger



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Saturday, April 13th, 1-3pm in the Oxford Municipal Building, 11 Green St., Oxford, NJ. <u>Downstairs, lower level meeting room</u>.

Doris will be teaching PAINTING REFLECTIVE SURFACES IN WATER-COLOR. "Learn the colors and techniques used to render shiny objects. We'll paint small studies of polished copper, silver and brass." The play of light on any material reveals its nature. On reflective surfaces notice extreme value changes and liquidy internal shapes. Learn how to apply rich color to create convincing still life paintings. **Participants to bring the following: a simple shiny object**. Silver, copper, or brass. <u>Also, bring a piece of soft fabric to place it on</u>. **Paper:** 140 lb

watercolor paper, cold or hot press. **Brushes**: Silver Black Velvet round brushes #8, #10 (or another brand of NATURAL BRISTLE brushes that hold water and come to a good point), #10 synthetic round brush **Paints**: Preferably Winsor & Newton, Holbein, Daniel Smith or Sennelier. You don't need every color listed. We can share. **For metal** (silver): Payne's Gray, Cadmium Orange. **For copper**: Cad. Yellow, Cadmium Scarlet (or Vermillion), Mineral Violet (or Violet), Ultramarine Blue. **For brass:** New Gamboge (or Quinacridone Gold), Permanent Rose (or Quinacridone Rose), Mineral Violet (or Violet), Hooker's Green (or Viridian), Burnt Sienna, Ultramarine Blue. Other supplies: water containers, paper towels, palette for paints, mixing tray, pencil, kneaded eraser & something to hold your paper on a tilt. Please RSVP to Pam if you will be attending. We only have space for 25 students.



Remembering Carol Southerland- (1933 – 2024)

Carol & I were friends for many, many years through WCARTS and the Warren County Singers and it was with sadness that I learned she passed away on 3/21/24 in Warren Haven. Carol was an artist, poet, song writer & photographer. She always had her camera wherever she went and was especially fond of watching the eagles at Merrill Creek. Artist Glimpse by Jean M. Perry: "Women Behind the Cameras "

We all know about Mathew Brady (1823-1896) and his powerful photos of the Civil War and the wonderful images of our beautiful country portrayed by Ansel Adams (1902-1984); how about Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946), who photographed those feminine portraits of Georgia O'Keeffe! But who knew that women have played a big role in the development and joy of photography, which premiered around 1840? These ambitious women did not have to compete in what, for centuries, were male dominated careers like painting and sculpture. Though the media at the time could be cumbersome, women had no problem creating important works.



British Julia Margaret Cameron (1815-1879) was born into a wealthy and educated family in Calcutta, India, where her father, James Pattle, was a respected official who worked for the East India Co. In 1838, Julia married Charles Cameron, who was a jurist employed by the Supreme Council of India. They had 6 children and moved to the Isle of Wright near the Tennysons. At age 48, Julia fell in love with photography after receiving a camera as a gift from her daughter. Julia became a favorite portrait photographer of the Victorian era's Pre -Raphaelite movement. She produced a series of photos for Tennyson's "Idylls of the King", for which the lovely members of this movement were her models. Cameron used a process for her work to produce albumen prints from wet collodion glass negatives. Because of this technique and early on, she became known for having her fingerprints on her blurry and out of focus works, and for cracked plates. But some of her most famous sitters were scientist Charles Darwin and poet Robert Browning.

Imogen Cunningham (1883-1976) worked in the studio of American Indian photographer, Edward Curtis. While studying in Berlin, she became an expert in the platinum printing technique. She belonged to the f64, an influential society of photographers in California, which concentrated on sharp, simplified images of nature, landscapes and even nudes. The name, f64, was conceived from the smallest aperture setting to produce the greatest depth of field. Imogen had 3 children. While raising her family, she had a beautiful garden that inspired her photographs, which were often compared to Georgia O'Keeffe's paintings.



Dorothea Lange (1895-1965) is credited with one of the most famous photographs



of the 20th century. "Migrant Mother" records the era of the Great Depression. Interesting to note that abstract art of the Modern Movement was popular then. Lange's work was anything but! She was employed by the government programs, the Federal Art Project of 1935 and Farm Security Administration, documenting the lives of farm workers. In 1936, she photographed the pea fields and workers in Nipomo, CA. Her famous photo, "Migrant Mother", depicts a 32 year old widow and mother of 7, Florence Thompson. Lange reported in her notes that Mrs. Thompson told her that "the crop froze this year, the family is destitute" and that very morning, they sold the tires of their car for food. Lange portrays Florence as a worried mother, rather than a worker. It makes you realize how fortunate we are. The photo is a vintage gelatin-silver print. Lange also worked for the WRA, or War Relocation Authority, which placed Japanese Americans into camps throughout the United States during the 1940's.

Bernice Abbott (1898-1991) said, "The camera speaks a language intelligible to all." So, why not find your creative edge, too! There were/are many great women photographers!

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
