Spring Artist Workshop Day— April 26, 2025



This is an in person event open to members and non-members (18+yrs). This all day workshop will be held Saturday April 26, 2025 from 8:30am to 4pm at Saint Peter & Paul Church, 360 US Hwy 46, Great Meadows, NJ 07838. The workshop is limited to 20 students. Register by April 21st, online though wcarts.org or by mail, for a full day of artful immersion. Workshop fee includes light breakfast, lunch and all supplies needed for the day. Member fee is \$95 and non-member fee is \$130.

We start the day at 9am with Keith Garubba for a 3 hour Paper Marbling Experience. Discover the magic of marbling decorative and abstract papers with this easy to pickup workshop to a centuries old practice. Participants will be guided through the techniques and history of Turkish Marbling with Acrylics. All materials will be provided by the instructor. In this workshop

you will: create 10 marbled papers, sized 12" x 19", yours to keep, Learn 4 (or more) cool patterns fundamental to marbling, Explore spontaneity in freestyle marble designs, Build on skills your learn to create floral and other imagery on water.

After enjoying lunch, Warren County ARTS President, Pamela Dulaff, will teach the afternoon workshop from 1-4pm in which we'll make use of some of the papers, made in the morning, to create a soft cover handmade journal. This journal will be bound with the decorative & functional Long Stitch Heart Stitch binding. You will have the choice of watercolor, mixed media or drawing paper for the pages inside. Sounds like an amazing day to me!!

Artist Glimpse- "The Art of Iconography" by Jean Marie Perry

Recently, I took part in an iconography painting workshop given by our very talented Pastor, Rev. Bob Simon. The style was to replicate that of the 13th and 14th C Byzantine artists. Now, I have taught portraits of the saints and Holy Family to my classes at the church, but never so complicated and, at



times, stressful! Our Pastor displayed around 20 or more works that he himself had completed, gifted us with a book that was written by his instructor, Peter Pearson, and handed out sheets of directions, with which we followed Rev. Bob. We started out with a prayer, which we definitely needed! We each were given a block of wood, brushes in specific sizes, pencils and tracing paper. Our subject was Jesus. We covered our surface with a yellow paint and traced the outline of Jesus's image. We proceeded to apply thin layers of colors. This is important as the process of applying the paint is a build-up of layers and geometric plains of colors. The colors were specific, according to the saint, and were a mix of acrylics.

Ancient methods made use of natural minerals, crushing the pigments into a powder and mixing them with egg yolks to create an egg tempera, which was fast drying and adhered well to a surface. Of course, modern acrylics help the process! In our project, some measuring was involved and the application of gold leaf for the halo was special. I think, because it was my first true Byzantine "Icon" or "Ikon" in the Orthodox style, I felt overwhelmed, but in the end, at peace. It was a holy event! It is believed that the first religious icons were painted by St. Luke the Evangelist, who painted images of Mary, Mother of Jesus. The story tells us that Luke showed them to Mary, and she approved! These portraits are still in existence and venerated today! Constantine the Great was a great admirer of the Icon artists, giving them a break from taxes!! Emperor Justinian also encour-

aged the art. And then there were the Iconoclasts of the 7 th and 8 th centuries, destroying icon art! Empress Theodora reinstated the veneration of icons in 843A.D. permanently. Monks and nuns were the primary artists of this work. The true job of the Byzantine or Orthodox iconographer is to depict the saints



as they appear in eternity, not

their earthly life. They do not appear like us. They are divine! I would say that religious art changed dramatically with the discovery of oil paint by Jan van Eyck in the 15 th C! Along with the times came magnificent cathedrals and portraits of real people acting like saints! Of course, we can see "windows into heaven" in churches and museums. Certain characteristics identify the specific saint. For instance: St. Patrick holds a scroll with a quote from his famous Lorica and a clover, which he used to teach the people of Ireland about the Trinity. Christians from Russia and Greece and other countries would recognize the saints easily by their "logos". Religious icons are not necessarily only paintings or Byzantine, but also stained

glass windows, mosaics, even sculpture. We have toured the galleries of religious art at



Bob Jones University in S. Carolina. We visited the Orthodox Church in St. Augustine, Fla. We saw an abundance of religious art, such as Fra Angelico's and Giotto's frescoes in Italy, and awesome works by the "masters" in the many churches in Germany, Austria, Switzerland and even Iceland! But, you don't have to be away from home to find this art!

Religious art is beautiful! Enjoy!! Happy Easter! Happy Spring!!
