



May Program Highlight-Watercolor Workshop with Christina Podobed



Join us on Saturday, May 10th, 1-3pm in the Oxford Municipal Building, 11 Green St., Oxford, NJ for a Watercolor Workshop by Christine Podobed "Animal, Fish & Fowl"

Learn to paint realistic animals with Christina Podobed. Use all your favorite watercolor supplies. Please bring watercolor paper, paints, brushes, mixing palette and water container. (Some of everything will be available for those who just want to try watercolors without having to go out and buy stuff). Please bring a reference photo of your pet or other creature that appeals to you. We will demonstrate under coloring and shading to make the image realistic.

June Program Highlight: Sumi-e Tempera Resist painting workshop with Pamela Dulaff



Join Warren County ARTS for the June program: Sumi-e Tempera Resist Painting workshop with Pamela Dulaff on Saturday, June 14th, 1-3pm in the Oxford Municipal Building, 11 Green St., Oxford NJ. Members Free, Non-members \$25. All materials provid-

ed. Beginners or experienced, adults 18+ yrs.

Experience expressive East Asian-style brush painting through a simple pattern design and masking process. The practice of Sumi-e is meditative, mindful and an expression of the present moment. There is a flow and rhythm to brush painting, Each movement- from holding the brush, loading the ink and the speed and pressure applied to each stroke- demands focus and control. In the Japanese process of Tsutsugaki, watersoluble rice paste is used to brush patterns on cloth, which is then dyed and rinsed. Similar to the well-known technique of batik, simple masking and dying cycles produce complex designs, without heat or the signature cracking formed by cooling wax. For this lesson, the medium that will serve as a resist is washable tempera paint. Colored and India inks will replace the dyes used in traditional batik and Tsutsugaki. Painters will be encouraged to practice and focus on a simple design, emphasizing repetition and pattern while familiarizing themselves with the capabilities of the sumi brush.

<u>Class size limited to 20</u>. All materials needed (except aprons) will be supplied. However you are welcome to bring your own materials if so desired. This is what we'll be using: Black waterproof ink, Sumi brush (size 2), Canson Watercolor paper 140LB, White Sulphite drawing paper, Washable Tempera Paint (one color is fine), Acrylic water-resistant Artists Inks (your choice of colors), Palette, Water container.

Artist Glimpse- "American Impressionism in New England" by Jean Marie Perry



As European trained artists returned to America, they sought out one another to work with and for support. This led to the development of American art colonies. An art colony is characterized by a distinct group of artists sharing a communal identity within, while being a part of a surrounding community. **Cos Cob** in Greenwich, Connecticut, just out of NYC, became Americas first art colony. In the 1800's, the area hailed beautiful scenery, tidal marshes, rivers, busy harbors, and farms. The

locals were fisherman and farmers. Edward Payson Holley, a farmer, and his wife, Josephine Lyon, sold inherited property and purchased a house, turning it into a boarding house. The Holley House and Holley Farm provided a comfortable and scenic gathering place for artists. Josephine and her lovely daughter, Constant, ran the home, which had a friendly Bohemian way of life, with lots of alcoholic drinks, good meals from the farm and flirtatious caretakers! Writer Willa Cather and artists J. Alden

Weir, John Twachtman, Theo Robinson and Childe Hassam were regular customers. Everything an artist needed was within a stone's throw of the house. Students and tourists loved watching Twachtman work and his colorful personality added to the show! Artists could head out for more inspira-






tion, as in Twachtman's "White Bridge" or Robinsons's "Boats at the Landing".

Enlightened by his European stay, in 1899 artist Henry Ward Ranger decided that he wanted to start an art colony in Connecticut and found Old Lyme the perfect location. One thing in his favor was the fact that Miss Florence Griswold (1850-1937) of Old Lyme had found that keeping up the large house of her deceased parents was financially too difficult. She decided to open a boarding house, a respectable job for a refined woman as herself. Florence was a gracious hostess. Rooms cost \$7/week with a jug of water daily. Rent for a studio in the barn was \$5/month. She exhibited the artists' works in her hall, encouraging guests to purchase them. She also kept the bohemian life style in check! Among the artists who stayed at the Griswold home were Matilda Brown, Robert Vonnoh, Willard Metcalf

and others. When Hassam arrived, the town became known as "American Giverny"! Hassam's painting of the historic



ant River with backpacks in tow. The invention of the collapsible tube in the 1840s gave artists an edge for long hours of plein air painting! And they loved painting on wood panels or canvas!

"Congregational Church" was a popular topic. Artists and students would hike out to the Lieuten-

J. Alden Weir was the most difficult artist to transition into the American Impressionist movement. After all, his father was an art instructor at West Point! Detail, detail! But after spending time with William Merritt Chase and Childe Hassam, he took the chance! He acquired a 153 acre property in Branchville, Connecticut in exchange for a painting! His home and family was inspiration for his art. Many friends/artists, including John Singer Sargent, visited!

The Griswold Museum, Bush Holley House, and the Weir farm are listed as NRHP, where nature and art classes thrive.

With a beautiful spring and summer ahead, I hope Connecticut is on your bucket list! It's worth the trip!
