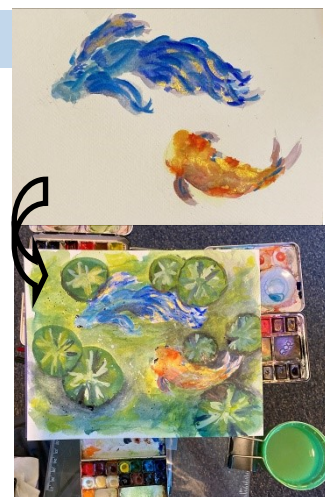

## June Program Highlight: Sumi-e Tempera Resist painting workshop with Pamela Dulaff



**Join Warren County ARTS for the June program: Sumi-e Tempera Resist Painting workshop with Pamela Dulaff on Saturday, June 14th, 1-3pm in the Oxford Municipal Building, 11 Green St., Oxford NJ.** Members Free, Non-members \$25. All materials provided. Beginners or experienced, adults 18+ yrs. Class size limited to 20. *Workshop will be held in the downstairs meeting room.* Please pre-register.

Experience expressive East Asian-style brush painting through a simple pattern design and masking process. The practice of Sumi-e is meditative, mindful and an expression of the present moment. There is a flow and rhythm to brush painting, Each movement- from holding the brush, loading the ink and the speed and pressure applied to each stroke- demands focus and control. In the Japanese process of Tsutsugaki, water soluble rice paste is used to brush patterns on cloth, which is then dyed and rinsed. Similar to the well-known technique of batik, simple masking and dyeing cycles produce complex designs, without heat or the signature cracking formed by cooling wax. For this workshop, the medium that will serve as a resist is washable tempera paint. Colored and India inks will replace the dyes used in traditional batik and Tsutsugaki. Painters will be encouraged to practice

and focus on a simple design, emphasizing repetition and pattern while familiarizing themselves with the capabilities of the sumi brush. All materials needed (except aprons) will be supplied for 20 attendees. However you are welcome to bring your own materials if so desired. This is what we'll be using: Black waterproof ink, Sumi brush (size 2), Canson Watercolor paper 140LB, White Sulphite drawing paper, Washable Tempera Paint (one color is fine), Acrylic water-resistant Artists Inks (your choice of colors), Palette, Water container.

## July—Annual Summer Picnic: Saturday, July 19th 1-4pm

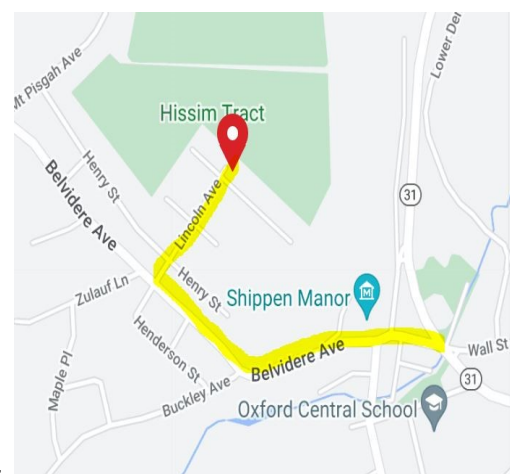

At the T intersection with Scranton Parkway continue straight to park beside Peggy's house (19 Scranton Pkwy) which is a gray cape code style house. Those coming from North, take Rt 46 to Rt 31 South in Buttzville. At the 1st traffic light, turn right and continue past the shops and continue up the hill past Shippen Manor. ## Artist Glimpse- “Maria Sibylla Merian (1647 –1717)” by Jean Marie Perry



When I think of summer, insects and flowers come to mind and Maria Sibylla Merian! Born in Frankfort and living her adult life in Holland, Maria was the daughter of a Swiss engraver and publisher. Her father had a tremendous influence on the career she chose. Her father died when she was just three, but she was always influenced by his work, “A Publication of Scientific Flower Engravings”. Early on, Maria was interested in insects and became an entomologist and scientific illustrator. Her Flemish stepfather, was a flower painter. He taught her and encouraged her work. She married at 18 to Johann Graff, one of her stepfather’s students. Unlike other students who worked from pictures, she used live specimens for her studies. Her first works were actually designed for needlework!

Merian was once visited by a German biographer, Joachim von Sandrart, a German biographer, who reported that she “made oil and watercolor of flowers, fruits and birds, etc. and other filth”. But she did not let that bother her! The same year, she published her first volume of flower engravings, “New Flower Book” and 2 years later, her 2nd volume!

In 1685, Merian, her 2 daughters and widowed mother, moved to W. Friedland, a Dutch province, to join her brother, a labadist, who lived in a castle. He died a year later They remained there until her mother died. Her husband begged them to return to Germany. She refused and they divorced later.



Merian and children moved to Amsterdam, a busy cosmopolitan city, where she became friends of the director of the Botanical Gardens (father of Rachel Ruysch) and a collector of zoological and botanical specimens. It was an incredible opportunity for her work. For the most part, Merian worked on parchment and used semi-transparent watercolors.

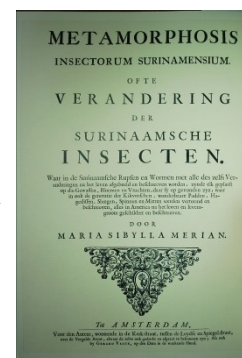
Prior to Merian’s studies of insects and flowers, people believed that butterflies and moths came fully grown right out of the soil! Merian revolutionized this theory by studying their life cycles. She raised them herself from eggs, fed them and recorded all stages. Her work is considered scientific. Merian laid the foundation for the classification of plants and animals later developed by Charles Linnaeus (1707-1778).

In 1699, the city of Amsterdam paid for Merian to travel to Dutch Guiana (Surinam), on the N.E. coast of South America. What an adventure! There, she recorded and observed the lifestyles and customs of the natives, insects, plants and animals. From this study, she published her magnificent “Metamorphosis

Insectorum Surinamensium” in 1705. The plates were drawn meticulously and hand colored by Merian herself. The book was in popular demand, selling thousands! She revolutionized the study of botany and zoology, creating an important phase in European and scientific history!

A second publication was planned, but Merian suffered a stroke in 1715. Maria Sibylla Merian died in 1717.
